4-H ONLINE

We hope you will enroll soon for the new 2022/2023 4-H year by going online to <u>https://v2.4honline.com/</u> and renew your family's 4-H enrollment. Online enrollment began in October and enrollment is now picking up and going strong. If you have any trouble, please contact us so we can get you signed up ASAP.

The enrollment fee can be paid through the Extension Office, but you will need to indicate payment by check. You can also still pay with a credit card if you prefer. If your club is paying for member enrollments the office has a county coupon to use when enrolling. Indicate payment by check and the office will insert coupon prior to approval and your club will be billed. Clubs will need to pay 4-H Council for reimbursement.

If your family is paying the fee, you can also use a coupon by indicating payment by check. You can pay the Extension office and we can insert the coupon code prior to approval.

All health information is completed during enrollment. Once submitted the enrollment will be "pending" and will need to be "approved" by our office. If anything is missing, we will be in contact with you by email.

If you can't recall which email address you used to set up the account, give us a call or send us an email and we will help you out. DO NOT create a new family account. If you cannot remember the password used, click on "I forgot my Password" and you will be sent a temporary password to get in to your account.

<u>Remember if you re-enroll by November 15, the club with the most</u> <u>re-enrollments of current members will receive a pizza party.</u>

FORD COUNTY 4-H DEADLINES & RSVP's

Deadlines and RSVP's are important. Responding to these requests in a timely fashion is important as we work to prepare for programs & meetings and out of respect for the people involved. Many times these deadlines are set by the state (i.e. KSF and KJLS entry deadlines) other times it is for handouts, food or interest in the program.

We understand that sometimes things come up and we will try our best to accommodate if we can. While we hate to turn anyone away, we are not always able to accept or accommodate late additions or late responses. Responsibility is one of the life skills that 4-H strives to teach young people. Please be courteous of everyone's time and help us to instill these virtues in our young people. This will help us to run a more efficient and effective 4-H program.

4-H Community Leader and 4-H Council Meetings

The next 4-H Community Leader and 4-H Council meetings will be *Monday, November 28, 6:30 pm. and 7:00 pm. at the Ford County Fair Building.* 4-H Council Officer Elections will be held.

To assist with trying to keep 4-H Council meetings moving along and not too long, we asked those members wanting to run for an office to complete an Officer Application. This application can be found online on our main page on our Ford County's website. This needs to be submitted before the next Council Meeting, November 28. Only those submitting nomination forms will be considered for the office.

The Parade of Lights is also scheduled for Monday, November 28. Ford County 4-H Council has provided Chili and drinks for parade participants who would like to eat prior to the parade starting. If we have chili left prior to our meetings, members may also eat.

We will start serving at approximately 5:00 pm. If your club can help with any of the ingredients or with serving, please let Ethel know at the Extension Office. Farm Bureau is providing the hamburger meat and Richland Boosters club has volunteered to provide the hot chocolate mix. This is one of the 4-H Council's community service projects for the year.

Officer Training

Don't forget Officer Training will be held on Saturday, November 12, 11 am to 2 pm. At the Dodge city Senior Center. Members will need to register by November 8 to the office There will be a <u>session for Community Leaders</u> so we hope community leaders will plan to attend. If low registration, the training may be cancelled.

PROJECT SELECTION

It is very important to sit down as a family to select 4-H projects for the upcoming year. **4-H IS A FAMILY AFFAIR,** so time required, costs involved, parental help, etc. should all be carefully considered when selecting projects. A 4-H project is designed to encompass the entire 4-H year, including project meetings, special events/contests, individual time, fair exhibits, record books, etc. It is usually suggested to take only a few projects when first starting in 4-H. We have project selection guides available in the office if you'd like to learn more about the different projects offered.

Leaders and Volunteers

All Community Club Leaders and Project Leaders need to sign up online as well. Leaders will need to go online and submit their Volunteer forms to 4-H Online to be approved. <u>Also note that parents do</u> <u>not need to sign up online unless they are going to</u> <u>be a Community Club Leader, a Project Leader,</u> <u>driver to activities, etc..</u> If you are interested in becoming a new leader, please complete the Kansas 4-H Volunteer Service application through the 4-H Online system. Go to <u>https://www.kansas4-h.org/</u> <u>resources/4-h-online-family-resources/index.html</u> for an enrollment guide for volunteers.

A registered 4-H Volunteer is a volunteer, adult or teen who has completed the full process including: application, screening and orientation. For the safety of both 4-H members and adults, this system is in place. Each year, NEW 4-H volunteers must apply for certification, or in the case of a returning volunteer, renew their status via a renewal form. Both forms are now available through 4-H Online.

- *Sign up on 4-H online
- *Complete the online Orientation
- *Complete a Child Abuse and Neglect Registry Form and the National Criminal Background Check online

Setting 4-H Project Goals

Writing 4-H project goals should take place towards the beginning of the 4-H year, and NOT right before record books are due. This publication will guide the 4-H member as they write and set 4-H project goals for the year ahead. Once the young person has selected their 4-H projects, they should plan out what they would like to learn and accomplish. It is very helpful when this process is done with the guidance of an adult volunteer or junior teen leader. Setting measurable goals will help ensure that the 4-H member has a positive 4-H project learning experience.

Scholarships Available for Camps and Events like KYLF:

Remember there are scholarships you can apply for if you are interested in attending.

The Ford County 4-H Foundation provides a \$50 scholarship.

There is also the Scroggins Camp/Event Scholarship.

All 4-H'ers of Ford and Gray County have the opportunity to apply for the Scroggins State 4-H Camp/ Event Scholarship. Campers wishing to attend a State 4-H Camp (i.e. Discovery Days, Campference, KYLF, Space Tech Camp, Sewing Camp, etc.) are eligible to apply for this scholarship. Those interested in applying for a Scroggins Camp Scholarship, must fill out the 'Scroggins State Camp/Event Scholarship Application' by the Camp Registration Deadline. The number and amount of awards will be determined by the individual county, with consideration to existing support, participation, and county need. Selection will be based on expressed need. For project specific camps/events, preference will be given to 4-H'ers enrolled in the project. No more than one scholarship may be received per 4-H'er/per 4-H year (October 1— September 30). Incomplete applications will not be considered. Applications are available on ford.ksu.edu under the 4-H tab or at the Extension Office.

Kansas 4-H Club Information

We have some new club leaders this year and we thought we would include some basic information concerning club leadership.

<u>Club Leaders</u> ensure that the 4-H club has the necessary leadership to provide positive learning experiences for youth.

Club Leader RESPONSIBILITIES:

- All individuals who work directly with youth are required to complete the Kansas 4-H volunteer screening process.
- Organize the 4-H club.
- Help members in selecting projects and online enrollment.
- With the 4-H officer team, help develop club goals and plan the program for the year. Have the completed program books printed and distributed.
- Work with the 4-H officer team in developing the monthly club meeting agenda.
- Attend all meetings and communicate dates and times of 4-H activities from the local K-State Research and Extension Office to members and their parents.
- Work with the club's Parents' Committee to identify the volunteer leadership needed for the club. Encourage all
 parents to become involved in the club program.
- Make sure all club volunteers complete the online volunteer enrollment and orientation process.
- Act as a liaison between the club and the local K-State Research and Extension Office. Pick up materials at the local K-State Research and Extension Office before each meeting to share with 4-H members.
- Complete necessary reports needed by the local K-State Research and Extension Office.
- Attend leader meetings and/or trainings provided by the local K-State Research and Extension staff.
- Encourage members to participate in 4-H activities beyond the local club.
- Work with the New Family Coordinator in welcoming new families to the club.
- Facilitate ceremonies to celebrate and recognize occasions and accomplishments.
- Delegate tasks & responsibilities to involve as many volunteers (adult/youth) as you can to complete these tasks.

Rate your Club Meeting by answering with Great, OK or Could Improve to the following questions:

- 1. Monthly meeting date and time is consistent
- 2. Agenda received prior to meeting.
- 3. Each officer does his/her job well.
- 4. The President uses an agenda.
- 5. The Secretary has minutes prepared.
- 6. The Treasurer has report prepared.
- 7. Business part of the meeting is short and brief.
- 8. All members take part in discussion.
- 9. Officers avoid doing all the talking.
- 10. Volunteers avoid doing all the talking.
- 11. Meeting place is set up when members start to arrive.
- 12. Guests are introduced and welcomed.
- 13. Educational program is interesting and interactive.
- 14. At least one project talk or demonstration by a 4-H member is given at each meeting.
- 15. Recreation is appropriate and suitable to the meeting place and size of group. Gets everyone involved.
- 16. Refreshments are offered.
- 17. Members engaged in learning.
- 18. Members connected with each other.
- 19. Meetings are fun and productive.

This would be great to discuss at your next meeting to find out how club members and leaders rate your club meetings!

Remember there are Junior, Intermediate and Senior Forms for General Projects and also for Animal Projects.

Please let Andrea or Ethel know of problems/issues you experienced using the form fillable record forms and the zbooks online program. If we don't know of your problems we can not report them and hopefully get things changed or fixed.

Record Book Suggestions from the evaluators

Congratulations on working towards your goals and completing your record books this year. Some helpful hints from the evaluators:

- Visiting with the judge at the fair and talking about your projects at the club tour are not considered formal presentations, that is considered project work. Fulfill this requirement by giving a project talk or demonstration at a club meeting or County Club Days.
- Project experiences: What did you LEARN? Consider utilizing some of the things you learned while meeting your project goals for this section.
- Remember the difference between citizenship and leadership. Citizenship is something done for the betterment of the community. Leadership is organizing, delegating and allowing others to have a part. (i.e. serving as a mentor for younger, new members or teaching others how to do something.) Also, be sure it is related to your project area. When in doubt, ASK QUESTIONS, of your club leaders or the Extension Agents! Keep up the good work!
